### **CoM/TBI Book Club**

#### Thursday, October 15th at 7:00 pm on Zoom

The Jew in the Lotus, written in 1994 by Rodger Kamenetz, is about a historic dialogue between rabbis and the Dalai Lama, the first recorded major dialogue between experts in Judaism and Buddhism. The book was primarily potent in capturing an ongoing engagement in the US between highly secularized Jews and Buddhist teachings.

Kamenetz popularized the term JUBU or Jewish Buddhist, interviewing poet Allen Ginsberg, vipassana teacher Joseph Goldstein, Ram Dass and other American Jews involved with bringing Eastern traditions to the West. The book also made prominent a Jewish mystical response to Eastern spirituality in the Jewish renewal movement, led by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi, and Jewish meditation as taught by Rabbi Jonathan Omer-Man. The title is a pun on the Vajrayana mantra *Om mani padme hum* which is frequently interpreted as "hail to the jewel in the lotus."

*The Jew in the Lotus* inspired a PBS documentary and was released theatrically in New York, Los Angeles and Boston.

# A True Champion of Justice and Women: Mourning Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg

**Hadassah mourns the passing of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, z"l,** on September 18, the first night of Rosh Hashanah, from metastatic pancreatic cancer. Born in Brooklyn, NY, in 1933, Justice Ginsburg — a life member of Hadassah — spent a lifetime breaking boundaries and championing women's rights, equality and justice. Today, thanks to her relentless efforts, the American legal system views women as equal under the law.

"The demand for justice runs through the entirety of Jewish history and Jewish tradition," she once said. A trailblazer with one of our nation's sharpest minds and a warm heart, a powerhouse with a sense of humor, an inspiration and an icon, she repeatedly credited Hadassah founder Henrietta Szold as being an inspiration to her, one of "the two Jewish women, raised in the United States of America, whose humanity and bravery inspired me"

and who she credits for being a "Zionist even before Theodor Herzl came on the scene."

"Ginsburg admired Szold's eloquent rejection of a male offer to say Kaddish for her mother when she died," wrote Executive Editor Lisa Hostein in the December 2019 issue of Hadassah Magazine. "When Ginsburg's own mother died, right before her high school graduation, Ginsburg had been told that, as a woman, she couldn't recite Kaddish."

In 1993, Ginsburg took her seat on the Supreme Court bench, and among what she considered to be her "big achievements" was getting the court not to sit on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur, along with the aid of Justice Stephen Breyer.

"Women's rights are an essential part of the overall human rights agenda, trained on the equal dignity and ability to live in freedom all people should enjoy," she said.

Ginsburg was the first Jewish woman — and the second woman — to sit on the Supreme Court bench. And for 25 years, she didn't miss a day when the court was in session, until she had two cancerous nodules removed from her left lung in late December 2018. On her first day back at Supreme Court in January 2019, she took time to offer her congratulations to the newest members of the US Supreme Court Bar, 14 members from the Hadassah Attorneys Council, as she has almost every year since the council began its Swearing In Program two decades ago.

Asked in a 2015 interview how she would like to be remembered, she said: As "someone who used whatever talent she had to do her work to the very best of her ability. And to help repair tears in her society, to make things a little better through the use of whatever ability she has."

### **Spiritual Leadership Search Committee**

The Spiritual Leadership Search Committee met in September and continues to make progress, with its members all playing an active role. During the meeting, it was noted that we have until March to submit an application for an interim rabbi, and we need to secure a waiver from the RA and USCJ to enable us to recruit an interim rabbi from nontraditional sources outside of the movement. According to their rules, we can have the interim rabbi stay for up to two years if we feel that would be the best situation for CoM.

The next critical steps to take are to develop a congregational survey to see which qualities are most important to our membership, and to generate a job description that accurately reflects CoM's particular needs as well as describes what we have to offer in terms of lifestyle and professional growth.

In conclusion, we want you to look out for the survey coming in November to solicit everyone's feedback. We look forward to your thoughts and opinions about this important process.

## **New Ways to Learn**


Education has changed a lot this year. Teachers all over the world spent the summer learning new techniques that allowed them to reach into their students homes to bring learning to them. Teaching and learning is in many ways more difficult during this pandemic but I think there is also a silver lining. Because we had to rethink everything about how we teach our students, I think some of the new techniques we are using may change the way we teach even after this pandemic is behind us. It seems that other educators are thinking the same thing.

For the PreK-7 students at OKCJS, we are using a variety of online and offline teaching methods. We know that there are many different ways that students learn and we are hopeful that by using different methods we will reach our students who don't learn best by the usual teacher-led classroom instruction.

We have learned that we need to limit the time we spend in teacher-led instruction on Zoom. Little ones can only tolerate so much! In addition to our two 30-40 minute teacher-led classes on Zoom each Sunday we offer the following learning experiences to our students this year.

#### **Independent Home Learning**

Our PreK-7 students delve into module-related content and concepts with a fair amount of independence from the adults in their lives. Lower elementary age children explore through a curated BAG of hands-on activities, while upper elementary learners receive engaging weekly challenges.





After completing the independent home learning activity, students post their work for their teacher to see.



#### 1:1 Hebrew Instruction

Each student has a 20 minute 1:1 lesson with their teacher each week. Students will be able to work at their own pace. This is something that we have not offered before students got to their b'nai mitzvah prep. We are expecting that all of our students will benefit from this 1:1 attention.

#### Weekday Games & Fun

Students can drop in weekday afternoons for what seems to them just fun and games but is actually review activities to help them learn. Teachers do love sneaking in some learning when students are not expecting it!

The older students love to play a game called Kahoot!, best played in a group setting. Players answer on their

own devices, while questions are displayed on the teacher's shared screen. There is exciting music played in the background and points are awarded for both speed and accuracy, all of which enhances the excitement. The software allows teachers to create games that review the content of their lesson and assess the students' understanding at the same time the kids are begging to play more.



The younger students love to build with Legos and we build the alef bet with them. As we build the letters there is time for conversation about Hebrew words that start with the letter and also time just to connect with the children and make them feel a part of our Jewish community.

Rachel Haus or one of the teachers reads to the younger children every afternoon. The children seem to enjoy this a lot. Rachel's readings are recorded so that children can watch them over and over if they want.

Students are also given time to hang out with their friends in Zoom breakout rooms. We want to keep our students connected with their Jewish friends. Even if virtual, the connection is real and important.



#### **Reflection and Peer Feedback**

Students post their work online so teachers and peers can provide encouragement, constructive criticism and suggestions for improvement. An authentic audience of peers encourages students to do their best work. We use the Seesaw app for this. Teachers post assignments in the Seesaw app. Audio and video instructions can be included for non-readers. Students can use the app to create videos, drawings and other multimedia projects to complete the assignment. They can upload photos of their written work. Students can comment on and like their peer's work which helps them maintain connection with their friends. Parents can see their child's work and post comments and likes.

all is officially here, and the High Holiday season is in full swing at the Congregation of Moses. For me, this past month has been filled with not only getting things ready for the High Holidays at CoM, but also prepping for my own stay-at-home High Holidays. This was the first year that I can remember not going to synagogue to pray with the rest of the community for the

High Holidays and getting together with family and friends for celebrating. I made sure to connect my computer to the HDMI port on my television so that I could watch the services on a bigger screen, and feel like I was really there; I even changed out of my pajamas on Day 1! Day 2 of Rosh Hashanah coincided with my birthday, and after services that morning, I spent most of the day on the phone and on Zoom calls with friends and family.

The High Holiday season kicked off with Selichot, which this year we celebrated alongside the rest of the Conservative movement during Selichot Night Live. A group of members from both the Programming Team and Religious Activities Committee came together to help distribute Mazhorim to the CoM community with our Gift Bag Drive Up event. ## Honoring All Etz Chaim Contributors



Etz Chaim was initiated as a legacy program for CoM in 1997, with an announcement of bequests promised by many of our members; leading gifts were made by Irving Schensul, Rosalie and Marvin Okun, Celia and David Davidoff, Shirley and Robert Grekin, Dorothy and Jack Levene, Werner and Beatrice Sichel and Joshua Weiner. Most, but not all, of this philanthropy was committed to our synagogue's endowment - to enable Jewish life for future generations at CoM. As CoM members know, Etz Chaim has had a tremendously positive financial effect for our community during the past 15 years, and especially during the last five. We could not provide the programs and facilities that our members can enjoy without contributions from Etz Chaim - or the doubling of our dues.

The loss this year of beloved and lifelong member Larry Rose was very sad for all of us. It is with profound embarrassment that we recognize an error in remembering Larry on this year's Scroll of Honor. We expect that



#### • ENP SPACE

ENP's SPACE (Ethiopian National Project School Performance and Community Empowerment) Scholastic Assistance Program promotes academic growth and improvement by providing supplementary tutoring to students in small groups. The program works to strengthen students' self-esteem and leadership skills by addressing obstacles to social integration and personal development. The program helps students to connect to their heritage and to incorporate this ethnic culture into their everyday lives. Students enrolled in the Program also receive preparation for army service, which enables them to choose from a broader base of positions once enlisted. Lastly, the SPACE Program provides all of its participants with a lunchtime meal, which helps ensure that students attend tutoring sessions engaged and ready to learn.

#### Lunch and Learn

Nearly 500 at-risk elementary students in 13 schools across the Negev city of Dimona receive extra academic help and a hot meal each school day, along with subsidized schoolbooks and the opportunity to participate in class trips. Lunch and Learn participants show significant improvement in educational achievement, behavior and self-confidence, and continue to excel as they transition to middle school.

#### JDC's Active Jewish Teens

Active Jewish Teens, a JDC program in partnership with BBYO and Genesis Philanthropy Group, brings together thousands of Jewish teenagers in 60 cities across the former Soviet Union to proudly embrace Jewish values and care for their communities. In a region where being Jewish was once a detriment and suppressed by countless people in the face of discrimination, this new generation is building lasting connections with Jewish life and each other.

#### JDC's Supportive Housing for Israelis with Disabilities

Many people with disabilities rely on their parents or an institution to help them with daily tasks. Independent living means taking on all those responsibilities, possibly for the first time. JDC created Supportive Housing to help people with disabilities experience independent living when they are ready.

#### JDC's Families First

In Israel, 31% of children live below the poverty line. JDC, in partnership with the Israeli government, launched Fami-lies First, a groundbreaking initiative that addresses the wide-ranging needs of poor families by giving them the tools to enable them to create real change and break the bonds of poverty. Families First works with over 3,000 families from 90 communities across Israel representing all sectors of Israeli society. The Families First Initiative is equipping families across Israel to become independent and ensure a better future for their children.

#### JDC's Aid to Impoverished Seniors in the Former Soviet Union

Across Eastern Europe and Asia—in countries like Ukraine, Moldova, Russia and Belarus—over eighty thousand Jews live in desperate conditions. Victims of both circumstance and oppression, they have faced the unimaginable: Many are Holocaust survivors; all of them endured the worst days of the Soviet regime. Now, with pensions as low as \$2 a day, little (if any) family to rely on, and no personal savings or government safety net, these elderly Jews are left to face cruel hunger, debilitating medical issues and freezing winters alone. JDC has been on the ground in the former Soviet Union for decades, caring for the region's elderly Jews when the majority of the world didn't even know they existed. Through a network of Hesed Social Welfare Centers, they ensure that the former Soviet Union's Jews in need are able to not only to survive, but age with dignity and the support of a caring Jewish community.

#### • JDC's Children's Initiative in the Former Soviet Union

This JDC program provides basic food, medicine, shelter and clothing for children in former Soviet countries, many of whom are impoverished and/or from homes suffering from hunger, unemployment, alcoholism, drug abuse and family strife. Such support ensures basic nutrition and care that is lacking among tens of thousands of Jewish children at risk across the former Soviet Union.

Programs described above are administered by Jewish Federation partner organizations, JDC and the Jewish Agency for Israel. The Colef Fund has previously supported each of the programs listed.
