While we are less connected to harvesting in our lives, entering into a covenant with God at Mt. Sinai remains a seminal event in our Jewish memory.

The Wilderness of Transition

The school year is winding down and the summer heat (and humidity!) has arrived in full force. That must mean it

is also time to begin our annual reading of the book of Bemidbar, Numbers. For the coming weeks we travel with the Israelites on their forty-year sojourn in the midbar. If only Moshe would have asked directions!

The key element of the Book of Numbers can be most readily found in its very title, Bemidbar which means "in the wilderness" (though often translated as "in the desert"). The word "midbar" is derived from the Hebrew letters dalet-bet-resh, a Hebrew root whose primary meaning is "speak."

One of my favorite places in Israel is the Negev. While in 2022 it is hard to drive more than 30 minutes without seeing civilization, there are still those pockets of utter quiet—and at night, a deep darkness lit only by the moon and stars. It is in this midbar that I am most easily able to connect to our ancestors' understanding of the ultimate "dibbur"—the ultimate "speaking" by God.

It is not through the voice of thunder and lighting of Mt. Sinai that I am able to connect most intimately, but through "kol d'mma dakka," the still small voice which fills the vast and empty space.

This past year, the concept of midbar/wilderness has an added, metaphorical significance for all of us. Together we have walked in the wilderness of transition from Rabbi Spivak to myself, from COVID pandemic to epidemic, from being at home to returning back into the world. Many of us have been left feeling unmoored and disoriented, as if we too were wandering in a wilderness.

Our tradition teaches that the Shechinah – God's imminent presence – did not desert us during that temporary Sinai sojourn. We are not being deserted now either – and we are not deserting one another. In fact, as we move toward summer, we are coming together as a community in strength, creativity and love. While we may see each other less often over the summer, we can all continue those conversations, relationships and plans which make the Congregation of Moses and our community so amazing and beautiful.

And thank you to everyone who has been speaking and listening, sharing and brainstorming. I look forward to continuing our journey together.

Hadassah CEO Delivers Powerful Speech at D.C. Reproductive Rights Rally

May is Women's Health Month. Fostering women's health and well-being through education, research and advocacy are long-time cornerstones of Hadassah's mission. Yet distressingly, this is also a time when we are witnessing a major threat to women's reproductive freedom. Hadassah is unwavering in support for full and complete access to reproductive health services and a woman's right to make health decisions according to her own religious, moral and ethical values.

In mid-May, at The Jewish Rally for Abortion Justice, Hadassah CEO Naomi Adler delivered a powerful and impassioned speech in support of reproductive rights at the Jewish Rally for Abortion Justice in Washington, D.C., organized by the National Council of Jewish Women. Hadassah was a presenting sponsor of the rally, which drew some 2,000 activists from nearly 150 organizations, including a vocal Hadassah presence.



"We're so grateful to have so many friends and partners to stand with, to stand together. B'yachad. And that includes the legislators who are here today and who have worked with us to advance women's health," she said. "We must — and we will — persist."

Naomi highlighted Hadassah's commitment to being pro-choice, pro-women and pro-Israel. She also highlighted Hadassah's ongoing work to fight for reproductive freedom, including grassroots advocacy, rallying across the country, and our Amicus Brief Program. Watch Naomi's full remarks at this link.

Hadassah members from across the country joined together to send a clear message to Washington: women must have the right to make decisions about their own health based on medical guidance and their own values.

Naomi quoted Hadassah member Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, a champion for women's rights, who said: "The decision whether or not to bear a child is central to a woman's life, to her well-being and dignity. It is a decision she must make for herself. When government controls that decision for her, she is being treated as less than a fully adult human responsible for her own choices."

Hadassah has and always will unequivocally stand for women's reproductive rights and for empowering women with the knowledge to make critical health decisions for themselves and their families.


