

Shalom! One important Jewish value OKCJS demonstrates is dugma, the role it plays in setting an example. OKCJS's design is an effective program that serves the modern day landscape of Judaism. This innovative program is serving as dugma for other towns, and both communities can celebrate this victory. To be able to demonstrate how the school lives by its teachings is a gift to all. This is a new year, fresh start.

The OKCJS tzevet/staff is looking forward to the new school year and high holidays that begin at the end of this month. We hope you will enjoy the full calendar of events planned throughout September:

- Sunday, September 11th at 9:00 am (at CoM): first day of Hebrew school. Following school, at 12:00 pm, there is a community-wide picnic and geniza program (burial of sacred texts) for both the TBI and CoM communities.
- Sunday, September 18th at 11:00 am (at CoM): shofar-making workshop. OKCJS is partnering with Chabad of Kalamazoo. The community is welcome to join and we hope you will (ages 5-13). There will be a sign-up opportunity coming soon. Please sign-up if you intend to participate to ensure adequate materials. The cost is \$12 for the shofar but free to OKCJS students who pre-register.
 - Monday, September 26th at 4:00 pm (at TBI): family Rosh Hashanah service (45 minutes)

The list of joint programming is evidence that OKCJS has done more for the local Jewish community than provide a combined education program. The school has been a catalyst for uniting both congregations at the community level. With my background in public health and community-building, I am motivated by the success OKCJS has had in uniting and strengthening this small local Jewish community, regardless of differences in practice. The future looks

bright for strengthening and building upon this united foundation. The shared vision and collaboration of both Rabbi Estrin and Rabbi Schicker has been inspiring and enabled the religious school committee to identify effective solutions when challenges arise.

A foundational goal of the joint school is to provide a safe and inclusive environment for the students and to foster a lifelong love for Judaism. When I attended the New Directors Institute (NDI) this summer, many communities were interested in Kalamazoo's experience with creating a joint program for the two congregations. Directors from across the country are experiencing dwindling enrollment in Hebrew school and diminished interest in Judaism. As a result, many congregations are considering consolidating with local partners and therefore see our OKCJS program as a pioneer for the new frontier of Jewish learning. I am grateful to offer guidance to other

programs seeking the same success Kalamazoo has had. My predecessor, Nora Chaus, has been an invaluable resource for me to turn to while I continue to learn the ropes of directing OKCJS and it is in part due to her hard work, policies, procedures and outreach that the current program was set up for success.

At NDI, directors from California, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Florida expressed the challenges of creating dynamic and meaningful programs with few students enrolled. To many directors, the idea of combining denominations seemed like an insurmountable barrier. From what I have gathered from this community, there was a time when the idea of combining in Kalamazoo also seemed impossible. However, six years later, there is much the school can consider successful. The school has utilized an engaging and research-based curriculum designed to make learning a fun and social experience. Please reach out to me if you have any questions or input about our curriculum.

Additionally, the joint program allows the students to learn about different ways Judaism may be observed and to learn to respect those differences without judging one as superior. Beyond respecting our differences, the school provides a platform to celebrate commonalities and ways to unite. For children to be in an environment that naturally promotes inclusivity, sensitivity to differences, and a strong Jewish identity is truly remarkable.

With the help of both Rabbi Estrin and Rabbi Schicker, we have identified a new in-person schedule for the students to work towards the goal of a lifelong love of Judaism. 

Ben Lando (grandson of our beloved Ruth Lando) began his career in journalism in 2000, covering Kalamazoo city and county governments as well as local stories for radio stations and newspapers. He was based in Washington, D.C. as a reporter and editor for United Press International covering U.S. and global energy, political and security stories from 2006-09.

Ben relocated to Baghdad, Iraq in 2009 as a reporter for the Wall Street Journal, The Economist, Time and other outlets. During that time, he founded <u>iraqoilreport.com</u>, which remains the most trusted source for covering economic and security developments there. He returned to Kalamazoo in 2013 to start his family, which now includes the fifth generation of Landos.

In 2019, Ben published a single-edition magazine called *The Homefront*, which focused on the homelessness crisis in Kalamazoo County. In 2020, he launched **NowKalamazoo.com** news website and the daily email news and events roundup, which has served as our area's premier independent source for in-depth journalism, dedicated to fair reporting and analysis on community topics of interest.
