THE

I Pray for Peace

Like many of you, I have spent the last several weeks vacillating between deep sadness and utter rage. I wake up every morning and check the news while still lying in bed, steeling myself for what I might see, what may have developed overnight.

Far too many nights I have read news articles, opinion pieces, or texted with Israeli friends while my children's small sleeping bodies warm the bed beside me. I have snuggled Micah and Amiel while silently crying, thinking about the Israeli children kidnapped in Gaza or seeing in my mind's eye the newspaper photograph of the anguished faces of Palestinian kids holding out pots and waiting for them to be filled with precious potable water. I have read of the atrocities visited upon our Jewish brothers and sisters on October 7, grateful for the journalistic standards in the United States which shield us from actually seeing the horrific images, which can never be unseen. The images which are themselves part of the terrorism, to terrify all those who allow their eyes to see. Dayenu, it is enough to allow our minds to process and our hearts to understand the gravity of what has befallen us.

I have heard friends cry out in anguish, angry that non-Jewish friends have not inquired into their wellbeing while I have experienced the polar opposite. Friends from across the country have reached out while acquaintances in Kalamazoo who I have known for less than three months have stopped me on the street to express concern, solidarity, despair and hope for a better future. People have called, written

emails, sent cards and flowers, and shown up in person at CoM to express their solidarity with me as the rabbi, and through me to the entire CoM community.

I feel profound sadness that this political conflict has violently intensified during my lifetime rather than culminating in a Middle East peace which seemed so possible in the mid-1990s when I began to pay attention in earnest to the dynamics between the State of Israel and Palestinians. I feel rage at the political leaders of Israel who decided that annual attacks on the citizens of southern Israel and retaliatory bombings of Gaza were preferable to finding a way to make peace with their enemies. I am angry at the terrorists of Hamas but cannot allow them much space in my being. I leave that rage to their own people, people who have more than enough material after being held hostage themselves for 16 years without elections to, hopefully, choose more appropriate leaders.

And through all of this, I am acutely aware that I have been the rabbi of Congregation of Moses for less than three months. While many people have met with me on Tuesday afternoons and I've begun to have wonderful parking lot conversations or discussions at Kiddush after Shabbat morning services, as a community we have not yet really gotten to know each other.

I pray that we can extend each other compassion and grace as we move through this terrible time together. I pray that we continue to engage with each other respectfully across profound differences in perspective and visions for the way forward. I pray for peace.

Colef Fund Supports JAFI's Fund for Victims of Terror

The ColefTzedakah Committee recently made a major donation to the **Jewish Agency for Israel's Fund for Victims of Terror**, which provides emergency aid for those in dire need.

To help survivors in the wake of tragedy, the fund provides financial assistance in as quickly as 48 hours, as well as ongoing care to get individuals and families on the road to recovery.

Refugee Friends Free Store

Even before Afghan refugees began to arrive in the United States in 2021, those previously involved with helping refugees sprang into action collecting donations for people with little else but the clothes on their backs.

As the donations of clothing, shoes, sewing materials and toys mounted, leaders at Congregation of Moses soon realized that our former Youth Lounge would be an ideal space to store them. Before long, dedicated volunteers from Congregation of Moses, Temple B'nai Israel, People's Church and others of all faiths from all over Kalamazoo County worked to transform this storage space into a "free" store, where refugees coming to Kalamazoo from all over the world would be able to shop for what they needed with dignity and fellowship.

The Refugee Friends Free Store accepts donations from Monday-Friday, 8:30 am - 12:30 pm, except on Jewish and legal holidays - if you're not sure, please call the office at 342-5463.

Shoppers must have an appointment to come to the store. The Friends Store is always closed on Saturday and Sunday.

Volunteers are always needed to help sort clothes, pick up families, gather donations, keep records, and help our refugee friends find what they need.

The "Lucky Ones": Victims Treated at Hadassah Hospital

Michal Ohana, 27, a social media editor, just wanted to dance. She and a group of friends drove from Jerusalem to the all-night dance party near Kibbutz Re'im not far from Israel's border with the Gaza Strip.

As dawn broke and they started to go home, trucks and motorcycles carrying armed terrorists pulled in front of them.

Ohana literally ran for her life, dodging automatic machine gun fire and rocket-propelled grenades in a nightmare chase. She took what she thought was refuge under an abandoned Israeli tank. But when many others joined her, they became a target for Hamas gunfire. She took a bullet in her leg.

"I was one of the lucky ones," she said. "There were murdered people all around me." Hundreds of young people attending the event were killed by the Hamas terrorists.

Ohana, hospitalized this week at Hadassah Hospital Ein Kerem, shared her horrific experience with Hadassah National President Rhoda Smolow, who flew to Israel from New York and visited the wounded who had been transported to the Hadassah Medical Organization from the South.

"I feel privileged to be supporting a hospital that gives excellent care to the wounded civilians and soldiers," said Smolow. She conveyed the concerns and prayers of the nearly 300,000 Hadassah members, and the men and women of Hadassah International, all of whom support Hadassah's lifesaving work in Israel and throughout the world.

OvB Minutes Summary of October 18

A. Financial Report – Brad Hershbein

We expect higher spending going forward as we continue to adjust to higher prices. Thus, we need to update our dues structure, which has not changed since 2016, to add revenue.

MOTION: To raise the normal dues structure from \$1750 to \$1900/yr/family, with all other parameters of the graduated dues structure carrying forth; first-year dues to be raised from \$100 to \$118/yr/family. There will also be a letter sent to the congregation in November explaining the rationale for these raises. VOTE: 7 yes, 1 no – Motion passed.

The letter to the congregation will also outline various giving levels & strategies and whom to contact about special circumstances and adjustments.

B. Greeter Signup – Brad Hershbein

Involves greeting people at the door for services and major events, but also keeping an eye on suspicious activity and ensuring the door stays locked when not in use, especially in the current climate.

C. OKCJS governance document and CoM anti-harassment policy

Currently being updated.

D. Rabbi's installation preparations

Plans: Friday night service with oneg, Saturday morning service with kiddush lunch, all catered. We will need volunteers to help with set up/clean up and donations to defray cost; a signup sheet will go out with weekly blasts, and OvB members will call congregants.

We will be inviting TBI, the Kalamazoo mayor, civic and religious leaders, and Rabbi Elyse Wechterman (Rabbi Goldman's mentor and CEO of Reconstructionist Rabbinical Assoc.).

E. Purchasing Israel Bonds in light of Israel-Hamas war – Phil Oretsky

MOTION: Congregation of Moses to purchase an Israel Bond in a substantial amount, subject to President and Treasurer determination of availability of funds.

VOTE: 5 yes, 0 no, 2 abstentions

Addendum by email: Brad H. – After reviewing our finances, I recommend we purchase a 5-year Jubilee bond in the amount of \$35,000. This bond pays an interest rate of 5.43% and would mature in November 2028; it will help us preserve liquidity, increase expected return and marginally reduce stock market risk. A follow-up motion to purchase the Israel bond as specified was made: As of Wednesday, October 25, 2023, the vote: 6 yes, 0 no, 2 abstensions.

F. Colef grant to The Fund for Victims of Terror through the Jewish Agency for Israel

MOTION: That OvB approves distribution of \$32,000 to The Fund for Victims of Terror. VOTE: Passed unanimously
