
Holding on to Hope





We had several festive Hanukkah events including one of my personal favorites, the Hanukkiah lighting in Bronson Park, where we sang songs and feasted on special treats! The kids enjoyed a Hanukkah PJ party on the fourth day of Hanukkah where they were treated to latkes, donuts and apple cider, coordinated by congregant volunteers. The students also enjoyed making edible dreidels and hanukkiah.

We finished out the school semester with a potluck dinner followed by student-led Shabbat Services at CoM. If you missed these events, don't worry, we have more events planned in the future in which you can join us!

OKCJS Updates

During school hours on Sundays, the plan is to maintain a single entrance and exit for school, using the door near the Sofen Room. The front entrance will not be used during school. Someone will be assigned to door duty, requiring those not part of school to sign in. A KDPS officer will be monitoring the building during school hours on Sunday. Thank you to the Okun Foundation which awarded OKCJS a security grant to make this possible.



The school was also awarded a three-year, \$18,000/year Okun Foundation grant for Camp Keshet (total of \$54,000), with emphasis on teen engagement throughout the year. The intention is to bolster madrichim (leadership) programming and support Camp Keshet.

The Shana Winter Fund paid for me to attend a conference entitled, "Convening on Strategic Teen Engagement." I am feeling energized, with new ideas for teens.

Reflections at the New Year

I have always been a fan of New Year's Eve. My earliest experiences of the holiday included lavish meals at the home of dear family friends and staying up until midnight to listen to the unsanctioned neighborhood fireworks in a Chicago neighborhood. As an adult, I love making resolutions, always filled with hope that this year I will be among the 9% of people who keep their resolutions.

Most years, I take the opportunity of the New Year to look forward but this year I have been engaged in a fair amount of reflection. The earth shattering events of the pandemic, brutal Hamas attack on Israel, and the War in Gaza, along with my family's major move, settling into a new congregation and community, and just thinking about where my young children were a year ago as opposed to now, has got me meditating on the year that was.

There is much cognitive dissonance in the desire to be happy on a personal level while the Jewish people and the world at large are in so much pain. I also think that I have barely begun to comprehend how the colossal changes wrought by COVID have affected me, let alone how October 7 and its aftermath have forever changed Israeli society and world Jewry. This New Year feels more liminal than any before as I am truly humbled by the violence, death and despair that are all around me. What is a reputable response to being in such a fragile place? One of the pieces of spiritual technology that we have in our Jewish toolbox is prayer.

In my first year of rabbinical school, a teacher asked us to take on a new personal

practice for a month and journal, reflect and consider the effects of the practice on our lives. I chose to recite the Bedtime Shema each night before falling asleep. Contrary to its name, there are actually a series of possible prayers and psalms to be recited in addition to the Shema, including Psalm 91. It begins: One who dwells in the shelter of the Supreme One, under the protection of Shaddai, God will abide. I say of Adonai, God is my refuge and my stronghold, my God in Whom I trust. For God will save you from the snare-trap, from destructive pestilence. With God's wings, God will cover you and beneath God's wings, you will find refuge; God's truth is a shield, a full shield. You will not fear the terror of night, nor the arrow that flies by day, the pestilence that prowls in darkness, nor the deadly plague that ravages at noon. A thousand will fall at your left side, and ten thousand at your right side but it shall not come near you.

Most nights my reaction to these first seven lines of this psalm was cognitive dissonance: My life is not that bad and this is far too violent for bedtime. But a few times in my month of recitations I connected to these words with profound gratitude: Thank God I am not spending my days dodging arrows. Unfortunately, in the intervening decade and a half since my Personal Practice Project, we have all experienced pestilence and plague. And on October 7, what Israelis call Shabbat HaShechora, or Black Sabbath, we experienced thousands falling at our side. I guess there is comfort in that the Psalms really do speak to the full range of human experience, but I do not yet know of the redemptive qualities having lived through these traumas.

In this difficult space, I fall back on my earlier and naive understanding of New Year's. I hope for the best, wish the best on others and trust that in time we will begin to make sense of our world. Happy 2024.





FREE STORE UPDATE

The Friends Free Store at CoM has been providing free used and new clothes, jackets, shoes, toys, blankets, towels, sewing supplies and fabric, baby equipment and some household products for almost two years. Thank you to everyone who has participated in providing donations!

The store is regularly visited by refugee families, caseworkers and volunteers to pick up initial necessities and often again when the seasons change. Shopping for themselves and choosing their own clothes and toys gives dignity to those who have lost so much.

Refugees have come from at least 17 countries – Afghanistan, Turkey, Syria, CAR, Congo, Eretria, Sudan, Iraq, Namibia, Kenya, Tanzania, Senegal, Burundi, Rwanda, Yemen, Myanmar, Cuba, and Venezuela. Many had been living in refugee camps for years and arrived here via the US State Deptartment process.

Six month statistics, collected from June 1, 2023 - Dec 1, 2023:

988 volunteer hours of time – driving, sorting, shopping, picking up inventory 23 caseworker visits to the store from Samaritas or Bethany 444 shoppers

At the present rate, we are likely to double our number of volunteer hours and shoppers served in 2023/2024 as the word about the store has gotten out into the community.

A unique feature of the store is that several people who came to Kalamazoo as refugees now volunteer in the store regularly or help us over the phone with translation, when neccessary. Their ability to speak languages like Pashto, Dari, Arabic, Swahili or Kinyarwanda, has been important for serving the newly arriving families.

We also liaison with other community resources. For example, if you have a working refrigerator, washing machine, or smart TV that you no longer use, pick-up can be arranged to place the item in an arriving family's home. Sewing machines are also valuable—we have a volunteer that arranges for repairs.
