The "Fire Holiday" is Coming

Lag B'Omer will be celebrated this year on Friday, May 16. It is a minor Jewish holiday on the 33rd day of the Omer, 33 days after the start of Passover.

We count every day for 49 days, seven weeks, from Pesach to Shavuot, culminating in a celebration of receiving the Torah from God on Mount Sinai. The entire period of the Omer is notable for restrictions. During this time Orthodox Jews refrain from getting haircuts, getting married and listening to instrumental music. Anthropologists tell us that many peoples have similar periods of restraint in the early spring to symbolize their concerns about the growth of their crops. Our agricultural ancestors celebrated the barley harvest at Pesach and the Omer period is an extended prayer for a good wheat harvest at Shavuot.

Lag B'Omer is a brief respite from these restrictions and is celebrated with haircuts, weddings, music and bonfires. I understand the magical thinking that leads folks to not cut their hair as they pray for the good growth of the wheat crops. I also understand that the period of waiting creates a more subdued atmosphere that is not conducive for large celebrations, weddings and concerts. In all my years of study, however, I have never read a justification for the bonfires. This has led me to refer to Lag B'Omer as our "thinly veiled pagan fire holiday."

Our tradition has many elements of fire in the spring: from the detailed descriptions of how to offer burnt sacrifices at the Temple in the Torah reading cycle to Lag B'Omer. This leads me to believe that there are cultural traditions associated with fire that predate even our most ancient Israelite ancestors. (For comparison, the fall and the end of Sukkot are associated with the element of water and prayers for rain.)

The Talmud explains that Lag B'Omer is connected to the sages of the rabbinic period. There was a plague among Rebbe Akiva's students which is said to have stopped on the 33rd day of the Omer. In celebration of the end of mass casualties, we celebrate. Having lived through the coronavirus pandemic (Pu! Pu! Pu!) puts this story in an entirely different light. I used to wonder why the end of a plague was celebrated with a fire?! Now I feel, quite deeply, the impulse to celebrate and "burn" away the schmutz of winter and look forward to the new possibilities of spring.

Happy Lag B'Omer!

The book will provide the context for thoughtful and meaningful discussions that will lead to effective and practical action. The remaining two sessions will be devoted to a closer examination of the chapters in the book, as well as discussion of the results of the Evolve Symposium, "Practices for Defending Democracy."

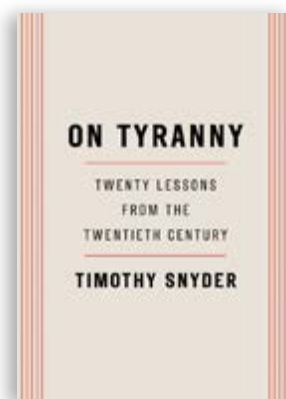
In October 2024, 26 rabbis and lay leaders participated in this symposium by describing how they are able (or unable) to pursue the 20 practices that are outlined in Dr. Snyder's book as a response to tyranny and hate.

Participants in this series will gain a better understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of tyrannical movements and learn about strategies and techniques to not only cope with, but neutralize the power that has been granted to modern-day tyrants.

"On Tyranny" is a call to arms and a guide to resistance, with invaluable ideas for how we can preserve our freedoms in the uncertain years to come. The book is slim, 125 small pages and/or a 2-hour audio book.

From now through May 4, 2025, you and all American Jews have the opportunity to vote online at ZionistElection.org to make your voice heard in the election for the 39th World Zionist Congress, "the parliament of the Jewish people." Voting is a crucial, tangible and attainable step towards creating a stronger tomorrow. The larger the voter turnout, the more loudly the American Jewish voice is heard.

To be eligible to vote, you must:

- Be Jewish (and not subscribe to another religion)
- Be 18 years or older by June 30, 2025
- Be a U.S. citizen or a legal permanent resident in the U.S.
- Maintain your primary residence in the U.S.
- Accept the Jerusalem Program (the Zionist movement platform)
- Have not voted in the November 2022 Knesset election (and will not vote in any future Knesset election which may be held prior to July 28, 2025)

It only takes a few minutes to vote online at zionistelection.org or by paper ballot.

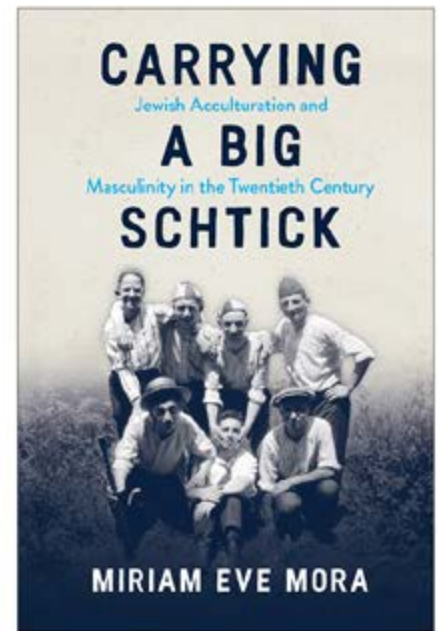

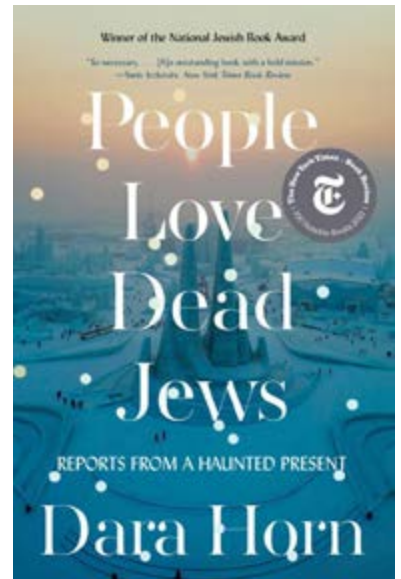

As Horn concludes in her introduction, the goal of *People Love Dead Jews* is "to unravel, document, describe, and articulate the endless unspoken ways in which the popular obsession with dead Jews, even in its most apparently benign and civic-minded forms, is a profound affront to human dignity."

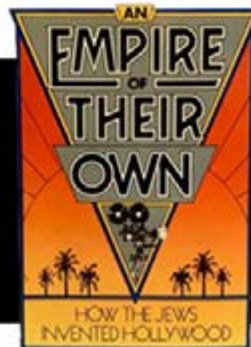

Let's Go to the Movies!

Orchestra of Exiles, Thursday, May 8 at 7:00 pm

The inspiring story of the creation of the Palestine Philharmonic Orchestra (to become the Israel Philharmonic in 1948) as the dark clouds of Nazi persecution gathered over Europe. Through pure determination and over many obstacles, prominent Jewish musicians and their families were brought to Palestine to create a world class orchestra. The orchestra performed to overflowing crowds providing hope and preserving the light of culture in a time of trial and uncertainty. The movie includes interviews of prominent Jewish musicians associated with the Palestine/Israel Philharmonic to include Itzhak Perelman, Yasha Heifetz, Zubin Mehta (a long-serving conductor at the Israel Philharmonic) and Leonard Bernstein (who served as a guest conductor for numerous performances). There are many classical music vignettes in the video. The video will be followed by a group discussion led by Rabbi Goldman on the role of music in Judaism and its importance to generations of Jews.

Hollywood, An Empire of their Own, Thursday, June 12, 7:00 pm

Produced by Arts and Entertainment and based on a best-selling book by Neal Gabler, "An Empire of their Own; How the Jews Invented Hollywood." The video provides the inside story of how Jewish moguls, who were almost all immigrants from Eastern Europe or their children, created the great Hollywood studios and produced the movies which brought drama, comedy, laughter and tears to hundreds of millions of people and defined American culture for decades. There is plenty of footage in the video from the golden age of Hollywood. The video also raises the question of why the Jewish moguls chose to avoid Jewish issues in their movies. The video will be followed by a group discussion led by Rabbi Goldman on the Jewish Influence in American popular culture.

Broadway Musicals, A Jewish Legacy, Thursday, July 10, 7:00 pm

Produced by PBS. Tap your feet and hum along as we watch segments of the most endearing Broadway musicals, and learn the story of how Jewish composers, lyricists, and producers created the beloved songs and stage performances which are uniquely American and Jewish in form and message. The video will be followed by a group discussion led by Rabbi Goldman on the topic (and obligations) of the Jews as a gifted people.

Saturday morning Kiddush is an integral part of the celebration of Shabbat and hosting a Kiddush is a great way for you to be involved in the CoM community. It is important that all members occasionally host Kiddush so that the responsibility is spread out over the entire congregation.

Each member of the CoM community is asked to host a Kiddush two-three times per year. Two member families are randomly assigned a date to co-host. Dennis Means or Wilma Kahn will be on hand to answer questions on your Shabbat morning. You will also receive an email about a month in advance with detailed instructions. You do not need to purchase food, though you may if you wish. **The request is purely to set up and clean up our normal fare.**

Please find your date on the schedule below and confirm by email that you will be able to host on that Shabbat morning. We realize that some of the dates might not work for you. We only ask that you notify us immediately if this is the case. We will be able to find an alternative date for you, but we will need time to find a replacement host and a new date for you.

Additionally, Camp Tavor has some exciting offers planned for our Kalamazoo families, so be sure to check out their flyer!

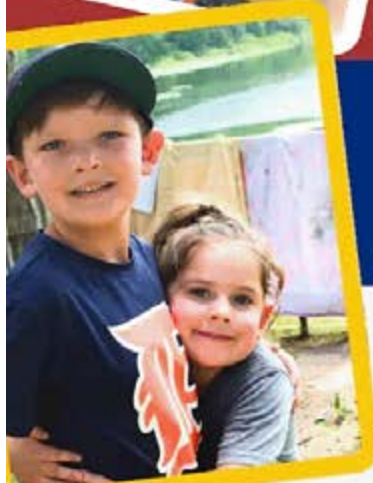

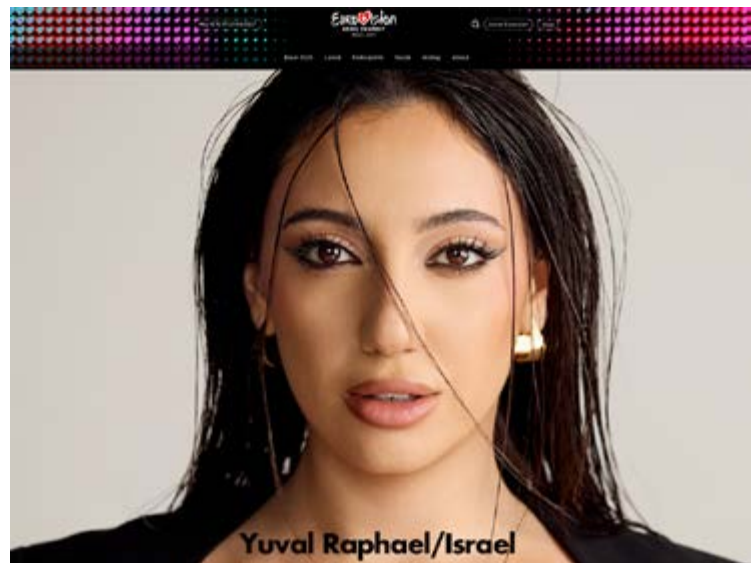
