OUR TREE RELATIVES

This is the first part of Rabbi Goldman's Kol Nidre Sermon. Stay tuned in the coming months for the rest.

On a beautiful Tuesday last May, the 100-year-old tree in front of our house came crashing down. It fell away from the house and its upper branches destroyed our across-the-street neighbor's hedge. Its massive trunk, wide enough to take three adults to encircle it at its base, blocked the entire street for days. Once the city cleared it from the road so that cars could drive through, its hulking remains, with exposed root system, sat in front of our house for months.



The loss of this tree is immense. After living here for less than two years, we have lost five of the six mature trees in our yard. Less than a year after we moved in, we had to cut down four trees because they were dead, sick, weak or could not survive the loss of the others. Had they still been standing during the storm that brought terrible tornadoes to Portage, or one of the powerful storms we've had since, one of their limbs could have severely damaged our house. So with the loss of yet another tree, we have only one old, majestic tree left.

This story has moments of hope, moments of beauty. My sons, two and five years old, had gleefully played at the base of this tree, a silver maple, the evening before he fell. They had recently taken to walking up the slight hill of our street with their bikes to zoom down from the driveway of the neighbor on our right to the driveway of the neighbor on our left. When we called them in at dusk, they could not resist zooming a few more times, using the incline at the base of the silver maple to get even more speed. Earlier that day, the day before he fell, Kieran and I had gone to Mulder's Nursery and purchased two trees, an attempt to begin to replace the four we had lost the year before. I am convinced that the giggles, peels of laughter and delight of my sons playing at his base, and our conversations earlier in the day as we walked around our yard discussing exactly where to plant the trees we had just bought, and where to plant others in the years to come, allowed the silver maple to take his leave. He knew that he was leaving the land in good hands. He knew that we would do our best to steward the land not only for ourselves but for the next generation and those who come after that.

Jewish tradition has tremendous reverence for trees. We have comments and stories in the Talmud that assert that trees are the closest living beings to humans. We are instructed to plant trees for the next generation, with the following story:

A young boy witnessing an old man planting a tree stops and asks, "Why are you planting this tree? You will never live to see it full grown." The man responds, "Because people planted trees for me, I will plant trees for others."

Another story, significant because of what it expresses about Jewish theology, states: If you are in the middle of planting a tree when the Messiah arrives, first finish planting the tree, then go greet the Messiah. Before the enlightenment, before the discipline of history was conceived of, all Jews existed in the time between The Revelation, or the moment we received

Temple B'nai Israel will hold a memorial service for Janet Heller on **Tuesday, December 9 at 7:00 pm.**

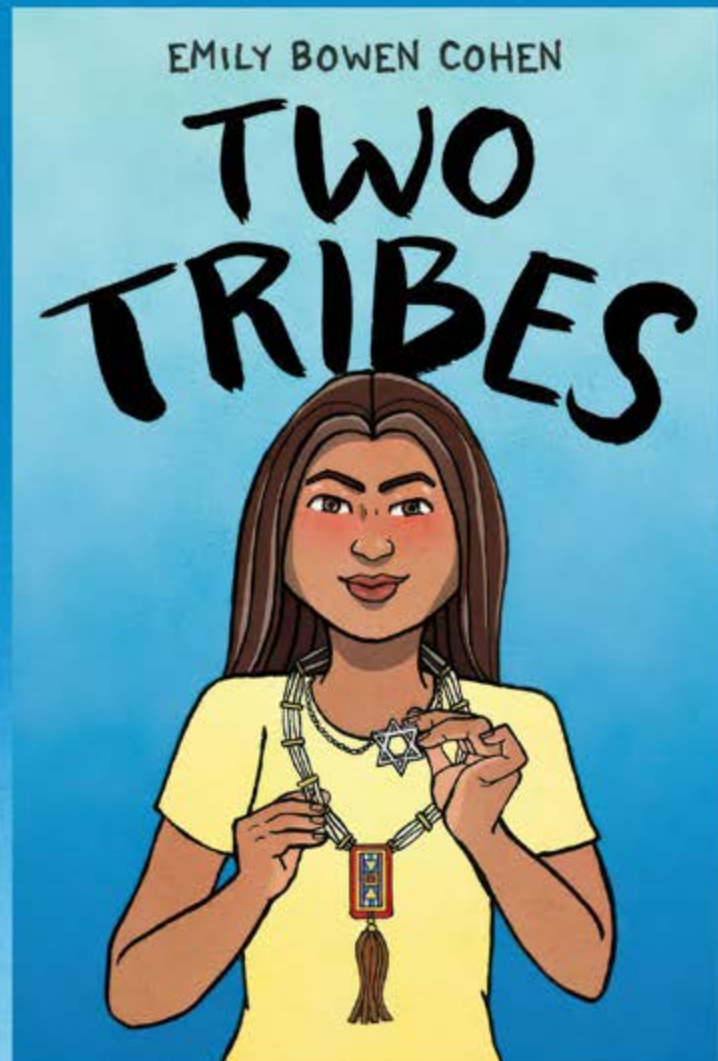

Emily Bowen Cohen creates comics that explore intersectional identity. She is Jewish and a member of the Muscogee (Creek) Nation. She uses personal experience to tell stories that examine contemporary American and Jewish culture. Emily grew up in rural Oklahoma. Her father was the Chief of Staff at their tribal hospital and her mother is a nice Jewish girl from New Jersey. After her father's early death, Emily was separated from her Native family. A decade later, she returned to Oklahoma for a bittersweet homecoming.

Emily drew on her personal experiences to create her debut graphic novel, *Two Tribes*, published by HarperCollins. The book has garnered many reviews and honors since publication in August 2023. Awards include: YALSA Great Graphic Novels for Teens, School Library Journal Best Books of 2023, a finalist for the National Jewish Book Award, and American Indians in Children's Literature (AICL) Best Books of 2023. She has spoken at numerous schools, from elementary through college and was the keynote speaker for Jewish American Heritage Month at the United States Patent and Trademark Office.

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who contributed food and participated, making it a memorable event for the kids as they shared in the joy of the Torah!

As if that weren't enough excitement, we also had the privilege of celebrating another classmate's Bar Mitzvah. Carter Hanson marked his big day on Saturday, October 25. Mazal Tov to Carter and the entire Hanson family!

Currently, we have 33 students enrolled from Pre-K to 7th grade, and our staff this year is outstanding. Our 6th and 7th graders work with both Rabbi Goldman and Rabbi Schicker, immersing themselves in prayer study and preparing for their Torah readings. The 4th and 5th graders learn from Jenifer Rubin, Isaac Rubin, Cary Mannaberg and Asher Saltzman on Wednesdays and Sundays, practicing prayers and exploring Judaism.

Students in PreK through 3rd grade enjoy Sundays with Aaliyah Smith, Anna Saltzman, Evan Sheinker and Angie Saltzman, participating in activities that bring Torah stories to life, along with crafts to reinforce the aleph bet. Rachel Haus shares her passion for Jewish literature during Sunday sessions. You might also catch Abram Wasser leading a basketball activity with a Jewish twist—like Rosh Hashanah ball, where players "dunk the apple" (basketball) into the "honey" (hoop) for a sweet year ahead. Or Lucas Ofstein, using his guitar to lead students in songs and prayer practice.
