TREES IN JEWISH TRADITION

As we are preparing to celebrate Purim, I am reminded how Queen Esther boldly went uninvited for an audience with the king, even though that was not done at that time! Now is the time to take bold action on the issues about which we care. With these thoughts in mind, I share with you the third installment of my Kol Nidre sermon from last fall. Enjoy!



I'm living in the devastation of the world as it is and desperately trying to inspire myself to work towards the world as it should be. From the Kabbalists, we have the Jewish concept of Tikkun Olam, of repairing the world. This concept, originally about healing God, encouraging God to turn God's face back towards us, has come to be the operative concept in American Jewish life. We are called to repair the world, to *Tikkun et HaOlam*. Or as my mother taught me, to leave the campsite a little better than you found it.

But in a moment when the forces arrayed against us seem so powerful, how can we even take that first step? Or if we are in the middle of the journey, how can we take the next step or the next? Rabbi Ellen Bernstein (z"l) wrote in her book *Toward A Holy*

Ecology: Reading The Song of Songs in the Age of Climate Crisis, "It is the job of religion to help align us with our deepest held truths and values, and to reorient us to the path of justice and love." She writes of being a river guide in northern California in her early 20s and encountering a passage from The Song of Songs that a fellow guide read one night around the camp fire. She writes, "I found myself wondering about the ecological dimensions of my own ancestral tradition... My instinct told me that any tradition that had lasted 3,000 years must have an ecological vision."

The Song of Songs, a book of the Bible traditionally read in the spring during Passover, is lush with natural imagery. It is often read as an extended meditation on the love between the Jewish People and God, a religious gloss of the more plain reading of the text, a great love story between a man and a woman. Bernstein, however, reads it as a meditation on our relationship with nature, animated by love. She writes, "the poet of the Song appeals to us to melt our hardened hearts so that we can truly come to connect with the other, be it human, animal, plant or the land. In the Song each lover paints a picture of the other, interpreting the other's beauty in terms of the plants and animals of the landscape that they love." Here is a bit of Chapter 4.

*How beautiful you are, my friend, how beautiful!
Your eyes are doves behind your braids.
Your hair is like a flock of goats
sweeping down Mt Gilead.
Your lips are like a crimson ribbon,
your voice is lovely.
Like a cleaved pomegranate are your cheeks
behind your braids. (Song 4:1 and 4:3)*

Invasive shrubs and vines are present everywhere and they pose a threat to the ecosystem of our beautiful wooded property. There are methods to remove or slow down their growth and give beneficial native plants a chance to thrive.

Come join us - bring work gloves, boots and old clothes (in layers) for invasive brush clearing in the woods and along the Broadway drive. If you have rakes, shovels or pruners, please bring them, but no problem if you don't. We'll provide tools, instruction and snacks! Come for as little or as long as your schedule allows.

There's something to do for all levels of skill and gardening experience. Light snow cover and cold temps are not a problem for this kind of work!

We'll also have packets of native seeds from our local seed library that can be planted in old milk or water jugs to get the seedlings started in advance of the planting season. This is a quick, fun project and is a great way to get started with Michigan native plants at no cost.



Gil Golde Paintings Closing Reception

Sunday, March 8, from 2:00 – 5:00 pm


Robin's Nest Gallery will complete its exhibition and sale of paintings by Gil Golde on Sunday, March 8 with a reception.

Father of Valerie Eisenberg, Gil's work spanned almost 85 years from the late 1920s until his death in 2015 at the age of 101. As a young man, he studied art in the classical tradition at the National Academy of Design (now called the National Academy Museum and School of Fine Arts) in New York City. In the 1930s as a student at The Art Students League and the New School, Gil witnessed the emergence of modern art and studied with and worked alongside artists who shaped modern art. He continued to paint, draw and create sculptures throughout his life.

While many of Gil Golde's paintings are in private collections, the family has decided to make the remaining paintings available for sale at prices that will allow others to collect and enjoy his work.

The proceeds from this sale will benefit the Kalamazoo Valley Community College's free summer art workshop programs for children in third through eighth grades called "Art & Animation: Characters and Comics."

Tachrichim: Burial Garments

Our Chevrah Kadisha follows the Jewish tradition of burying the deceased in simple white linen garments called Tachrichim. They are made from cotton, muslin or linen with no zippers, fasteners, buttons or metal.

Tachrichim are created to parallel portions of what the High Priest wore during the time of the Temple. The simplicity is to remind us to be humble. Tachrichim also do not have pockets to remind us that we carry nothing material with us when we leave the physical world.

The garments are similar for men and women and consist of closed-foot pants with a tie at the waist, a shirt with a tie at the neck, a jacket with a collar and a tie at the neck, sometimes an apron for women, a face cover and bonnet for women, and a head cover for men. There are ties around the legs and a belt around the waist. Some people choose to be wrapped in their favorite tallit. Finally, a large sheet is warped around the meit/ah, like swaddling a baby, before they are placed in the casket.

The *meit/ah* (deceased man/woman) is dressed by the Chevra Kadisha after they have performed the taharah (purification) ritual. Dressing the *meit/ah* is called *halbasha* (dressing). When we dress our dead, we tie special knots representing the names of Adonai. Everything we do during this ritual is to honor the dignity and holiness of the deceased. Dressing the deceased in the Taharah room includes several rituals and prayers. Before dressing, we say a prayer called *Sos Assis* with passages from Isaiah and Zechariah.

While most Chevrot Kadisha and funeral homes purchase Tachrichim from Rose Solomon, a commercial supplier in Brooklyn, there is a growing trend for Chevrot Kadisha to revive the practice of sewing Tachrichim locally.
